

PART I.

A CLINICAL REPERTORY

INTRODUCTION TO THE CLINICAL REPERTORY

PERHAPS the best way for me to introduce the CLINICAL REPERTORY to my readers will be to quote from the *Dictionary of Materia Medica* that part of the Preface which describes the portion here repertorised. Writing of the section "Clinical" with which each remedy is introduced in that work, I said :—

"CLINICAL."

"Next, under the head CLINICAL, I have given an alphabetical list of the diseases in relation to which the remedy has manifested or seems likely to manifest some curative power. This list is of no independent authority, many of the items being merely suggestions of my own. It is not to be regarded either as inclusive or exclusive, but rather as suggestive. But the list serves further purposes; and first, it enables me to save space. If I were to describe the sphere of a remedy in each of the diseases in which it has been used, I should be obliged to repeat the same indications many times over in slightly varied form. The main indications of a remedy are the same in any disease, and the fine indications will be found on referring to the headings under which they occur in the Schema. Further, the list enables me to relate the *Dictionary* to the *Prescriber*. A number of the names of diseases in the list will be found printed in italics. This does not mean that the medicine is more indicated in these diseases than in the others; it is merely to indicate that under that particular heading the drug will be found mentioned in the *Prescriber*, and that there its special indications are given and compared with those of other remedies. For example, under *Atropinum* is the following list: 'Blepharospasm. Convulsions. Enuresis. Epilepsy. Eyes, affections of. *Gastric Ulcer*. Locomotor ataxy. Mania. Neuralgia. *Pancreatitis*. Spinal irritation. Tetanus. Vision, disorders of.' On referring to the *Prescriber*, under *GASTRIC ULCER* and *PANCREATITIS*, *Atropinum* will be found mentioned along with other remedies. Finally, the lists will afford a convenient basis for compiling a Clinical Index."

The CLINICAL REPERTORY here presented is the work promised in the last sentence of the above-quoted passage.

It will be noted that the *Dictionary* was linked to the *Prescriber* in the Clinical section of the former. That link is preserved in the CLINICAL REPERTORY. But instead of the names of *diseases* being italicised, as in the Clinical headings, the names of the *remedies* are

italicised in the CLINICAL REPERTORY. In the example quoted above the words "*Gastric Ulcer*" and "*Pancreatitis*" were printed in italics to show that *Atropinum* under which they occur would be found mentioned under these headings in the *Prescriber* and its indications compared with those of other remedies. In the CLINICAL REPERTORY, under the heading "**Gastric Ulcer**" and "**Pancreatitis**," among the remedies given "*Atro.*" appears in italics. This indicates that under the same headings it is given in the *Prescriber*. Under **Locomotor Ataxy** "*Atro.*" appears but not in italics. This implies that it is not given in the *Prescriber* under that heading.

The edition of the *Prescriber* to which reference is made in this work is the sixth, which I prepared in the interval between the appearance of the first and second volumes of the *Dictionary*. In it will be found an Introductory chapter on "The Place of a Clinical Repertory in Homœopathic Practice." Having gone fully into this subject there I need say little about it in this connection. The chief problem of scientific therapeutics consists in the discovering of indications for remedies. All ways of finding indications are open to practitioners, and the clinical avenue is one of them. This is not the method which Hahnemann rightly condemned, and which is still the prevailing one in old-school therapeutics, that, namely, of seeking for remedies for *diseases in the abstract*. One result of this last method is that certain diseases come to have certain remedies assigned to them, and all patients who are found to be suffering from any given disease must be dosed with one of the remedies credited to it. Hahnemann delivered all who have accepted his scientific method from the thrall of this purely academic, artificial practice. He fitly described it as "treating the names of diseases with the names of therapeutic actions."

There will not, I think, be any likelihood of readers lapsing into this kind of practice through the use of my CLINICAL REPERTORY. The lists of remedies are in no way put forth as complete lists. In homœopathy any remedy may be required in any case of any disease. The occurrence of the name of any remedy under the heading of any disease shows that in its action it has a general correspondence with the most marked features of cases of that disease. This gives a legitimate point of comparison for a start, at any rate, in the work of selection.

It will frequently happen that the prescriber will have in mind a number of remedies which more or less closely correspond to a given case, and when he consults the CLINICAL REPERTORY this knowledge

will enable him at once to pick out of the list there presented the most similar remedy to his case. Should he still be uncertain, if the *Prescriber* does not help him out of his difficulty, he will still have the *Dictionary* to appeal to, in which each of the remedies named in the *REPERTORY* will be found described individually in detail.

Further, if there is any point of *Causation* in the case, or any striking type of *Temperament*, this work may itself provide the determining factor without the prescriber having to go further afield.

The use of the nosological correspondence is, as I have said, one method by means of which a similar, if not the most similar, remedy may be discovered. Another method is by ascertaining the similarity of *Specificity of Seat*. Some drugs have a predominant affinity for certain organs, and these drugs will often relieve a great variety of affections seated in, or arising from diseases of these particular organs. In compiling the CLINICAL part of my *Dictionary* I kept this in view. Many general headings such as "Liver, diseases of," "Spleen, affections of," will be found there; and they will also be found in the CLINICAL REPERTORY. The lists of remedies given under these headings will show the drugs which have been observed to hit these organs hardest, and will thereby give a very important point for comparison. The work of Paracelsus and his disciple Rademacher deals largely in Specifics based on this homoeopathicity of organ-affinity. The greatest modern exponent of this practice is the late Dr. Compton Burnett, who has brought once more to light vast therapeutic treasures which had been allowed to lie forgotten in the works of these great masters. Those who understand the value of such indications will find much to assist them in the CLINICAL REPERTORY.

REPERTORY OF CAUSATION

NOTE.

ALMOST all remedies have relations of some kind to the various accidents and conditions of ordinary life. Their symptoms are made worse or better by heat or cold, rest or motion, by night or by day, or other circumstances or conditions. Many remedies are related to the effects of certain conditions. This is not just the same thing as aggravation, though allied to it and sometimes identical with it. For instance, *Arnica* removes morbid conditions (apart, of course, from surgical injuries such as broken bones) caused by falls; *Ruta* relieves the effects of bruised bones. It is not correct in either case to describe these as aggravations, and therefore I thought well to arrange such relationships under a separate heading in the *Dictionary*. These I have now indexed, and repertorised, in the subjoined list.

Although Causation and Aggravation are not the same, they are closely allied. *Rhus* is related to the effects of damp weather, and appears in the list of remedies having this *Causation*; but it also has its symptoms, when not caused by damp, aggravated in a supreme degree by conditions of damp. Therefore the prescriber who uses this list of CAUSES as a rough list of Aggravations also will not go far wrong, and may find no little help from it in some of his cases.

The names of a few remedies have been added which do not occur in the *Dictionary of Materia Medica*. These, for the most part, I have enclosed in brackets. When a cause is associated with any particular effect, that effect is placed in brackets and precedes the name of the remedy which corresponds to it. For instance, "Washing clothes" causes ill effects to which certain remedies correspond. *Phosphorus* corresponds to headache resulting from washing clothes. In the list of remedies this fact is marked thus: "(headache) Pho." When, in a list of remedies, one of them has a qualifying word or phrase thus prefixed to it, the qualification must be understood to apply to that remedy only, and not to those which follow.

NOTE.

THIS section of the Repertory gives in tabular form the chief clinical relations of all remedies of the Materia Medica so far as they have been noted. They are included under the following headings: "Complementary Remedies," "Remedy Follows Well," "Remedy is Followed Well by," "Compatible Remedies," "Incompatible Remedies," "Remedy Antidotes," "Remedy is Antidoted by." There is also added the duration of action of remedies so far as these have been noted.

The term "compatible" is a generic term, and includes all the remedies of the first three columns—i.e., the "complementary" remedies, those which the remedy "follows well," and those which it is "followed well by"—but the column "Compatible Remedies" has been included because some remedies have been noted as compatible with others, without further qualification.

Many remedies have not yet had their clinical relationships noted. But I have not excluded them on this account; and spaces are thus provided for the insertion of their related remedies when found later on in practice.

NOTE.

THE Homœopathic Materia Medica consists potentially, we may say, of anything and everything that may be found in the universe. Man himself epitomises the universe, and nothing in the universe can therefore be said to be unrelated to him. It is his business to find out the indications for the uses of the substances at his command, and the methods in which they are to be prepared and applied. Some of them he has discovered, and the substances thus rescued from the unknown constitute the Homœopathic Materia Medica as it is at present developed.

The following lists will show remedies belonging to the different kingdoms of nature arranged in the order of their natural kinship. Readers will be able to discover how far natural relationship and clinical relationship correspond so far as the Homœopathic Materia Medica at present extends. The lists will enable readers to find how almost any given remedy in the Materia Medica is related to any other remedy in nature. The lists comprise—(1) Metals or Elements; (2) The Vegetable Kingdom; (3) The Animal Kingdom; (4) Sarcodes; (5) Nosodes.

1. METALS OR ELEMENTS.

An alphabetical list of the elements represented is given, each with its symbol and atomic weight. Prefixed to each name is a number. This number shows its position in the succeeding list, which gives the elements *in the order of their atomic weights*. In addition to this distinguishing number in the second list is affixed the letter "G" and a Roman numeral. This refers to a third list—a list of the Mendeleeffian Groups; and the numeral shows in which of these groups any given element is to be found.

2. VEGETABLE KINGDOM.

There are two lists given in this section—a list of natural orders in alphabetical order, and a list of natural orders in systematic or evolutionary order. In the first, or alphabetical list, under the name of each

order, all the remedies of the order are given, also alphabetically. The alphabetical list is distinguished by numbers which correspond with the numbers of the systematic list, so that the place of any remedy in each list can at once be found.

Suppose, for example, that it were desired to find out all the relations of Belladonna in the *Materia Medica*. On consulting the *Dictionary* it would be found that Belladonna belongs to the *Solanaceæ*. Looking up *Solanaceæ* in the alphabetical list, we find 20 other remedies belonging to the same order. Affixed to the name of the order we find the number "68." Turning to the systematic list, we find *Solanaceæ* bracketed with *Convolvulaceæ* (67), *Boraginaceæ* (66), and *Hydrophyllaceæ* (65), and followed by *Scrophulariaceæ* (69), &c. Under each of these orders, in the alphabetical list, all their members will be found. Thus the relation of Belladonna to any or all of them may be traced.

3. ANIMAL KINGDOM.

Of the animal kingdom a similar arrangement has been adopted—an alphabetical list distinguished by numbers corresponding to numbers in the succeeding systematic list. In arranging the latter I have been governed mainly by Francis P. Pascoe's "*Zoological Classification*." In the *Dictionary*, and the authorities on which it has relied, no very definite distinction between "Orders" and "Families" has been observed in describing the place of the various animals; but I do not think this will occasion any difficulty in tracing any animal remedy and its natural relations.

4. SARCODES.

I have found the term "Sarcodes" useful for designating the remedies prepared from healthy animal tissues and organs. They are "flesh" remedies, and σάρξ is Greek for "flesh." These are remedies of very great importance, and I have given a list of them, together with a supplementary list of remedies derived from altered tissues and secretions, as Urea and Uric acid from Urine, Thyo-iodin from Thyroid glands, &c.

5. NOSODES

Nosodes are remedies derived from morbid tissues and secretions containing the specific virus of diseases. A list of these remedies, the importance of which is becoming daily more recognised, concludes this section.



PREFACE

I MUST ask my readers to do me the favour to give particular attention to the prefaces to this work—not only to this, the general preface, but also to the introductory notes to each separate division; for, though the uses of each division are fairly obvious, and the arrangements simple, the REPERTORY is capable of subserving other uses besides the obvious ones, and these I shall endeavour to point out. That prince of Repertory-makers, Von Boenninghausen, described his well-known "*Pocket Book*" as being intended for use at the bedside "*and in the study of the materia medica.*" I may in the same way describe my REPERTORY as being designed "for use in the study of the *materia medica*" no less than as an instrument for finding out the indicated remedies. Homœopathic practice consists in knowledge of *materia medica* and knowledge how to use it. This demands unlimited patience and application in the study of drug comparisons. My REPERTORY will enable the practitioner to compare any remedy with any similar remedy in five different points, all of great importance in practice.

In my *Dictionary of Practical Materia Medica* every remedy is described from a number of different points of view. The clinical point of view is one of these, and under the heading "**CLINICAL**" I have prefixed to each remedy a list of the affections in which it has been found most frequently indicated in practice. In compiling these clinical lists I had in view the project of preparing, later on, an Index of these headings to enable the reader to find at a glance all the remedies which have been accredited with the cure or alleviation of any given state. The CLINICAL REPERTORY herewith presented constitutes this Index.

Whilst the preparation of this work was in progress it occurred to me that it would greatly extend the usefulness of the CLINICAL REPERTORY if I were to add one or two other indices at the same time.

One of the sections under which I have described remedies in the *Dictionary* is headed "**CAUSATION.**" This tells how remedies are related to conditions due to definite *Causes*. I have therefore added an

alphabetical list of CAUSES, under any one of which will be found named all the drugs which have been observed to be curative in conditions produced by it.

Another index deals with TEMPERAMENTS. Acute observers, from the time of Hahnemann onwards, have noticed that some remedies act well on some types of persons and not at all so well on others. The respective types of *Nux vomica* and *Pulsatilla* are well known; but many other remedies have preferences more or less well marked for particular temperaments. These are mentioned in the *Dictionary* under the heading "CHARACTERISTICS" as the types or constitutions the particular remedy is specially "suited to." In the second and third volumes I have put the words "suited to" in italics so that they may be more easily found. In the *Repertory of Temperaments* they will all be found completely indexed. This, I think, is of no little importance, since type of constitution is very often a determining factor in the choice of a remedy. There are some patients whose constitutions correspond so accurately to a particular medicinal type, that the corresponding remedy will cure almost any indisposition they may happen to have. But under "SUITED TO" are included not temperaments, persons, and constitutions only, but also *complaints* occurring in persons of particular age and type; so that this section becomes in a way a complement of the *Clinical Repertory*—the first and most important division of this work. The user of the *REPERTORY*, therefore, who may not find the remedy he is in search of in the *Clinical Repertory*, may possibly find it in the *Repertory of Temperaments* under the heading of the complaint the patient is suffering from.

The last of the repertoires included in this volume is a REPERTORY OF RELATIONSHIPS. This is twofold, and includes Clinical Relationships and Natural Relationships. The *Repertory of Natural Relationships* shows at a glance the place in nature of any remedy in question—mineral, vegetable, or animal—and how it stands in regard to its closest congeners. For instance, if a reader wishes to find the nearest botanical relations of any plant remedy he will be able to find them without difficulty. In the *Dictionary* is given the natural order of each plant. In the Repertory will be found an alphabetical list of all the natural orders represented, and under each is given in alphabetical order a list of all the plants of that order included in the *materia medica*.

But there is also given a list of the natural orders in their systematic or evolutionary order; so that every order is here given in juxtaposition with its allied orders. In this list I have prefixed a number to each order; and in the alphabetical list I have given each order the same

number. Thus on consulting the alphabetical list, not only will all the individual members of that order be found there, but the number attached to the order will enable the reader to refer to the numerical list and find in that the orders most nearly allied to it. On reference to these orders in the alphabetical list, all the members of each will be found.

This is often of importance, since there is a strong therapeutic likeness between members of the same botanical group. The chief function of homœopathy, it is true, is to individualise. This must be effected with the greatest possible completeness. But when once this has been done—and to effect this was one of the main objects I kept before me in compiling my *Dictionary*—grouping can be of the utmost value in the study and use of the *materia medica*. The mistake some homœopathic therapeutists have made has been in taking the grouping first, and thinking that this might prove a short-cut to learning the *materia medica*. It is nothing of the kind: it merely results in muddling the *materia medica* unless each individual remedy has been first of all depicted in full detail.

When this individualising of remedies has been mastered, the grouping becomes of great importance in practice. Of this both Dr. Burnett and Dr. Cooper made the most brilliant use. I need only instance the working out of the *Lobelias* by Dr. Cooper, and of some of the *Conifers* by Dr. Burnett. Those who wish to follow up the successes of these great therapeutists will have a light to guide them in my *Repertory of Natural Relationships*.

But, quite independently of all known natural relationships—I say “known relationships” because there is nothing in nature really unrelated to anything else—medicines are inter-related in various ways in point of therapeutic action. A knowledge of these relations is all-important to those who aim at accurate prescribing. Take the antidotal relation, for example. It is often as important to be able to arrest a medicinal action as it is to start it. A prescriber who cannot antidote a drug effect is like the driver of a motor who cannot put on the brake. Hahnemann was always careful to observe and record the antidotes to the remedies he proved, and later observers have largely added to his observations. Some remedies have been observed to prepare the way for other remedies; some to follow others well. Such remedies are termed compatibles. Some spoil the effects of others, and such are called incompatibles. When a remedy has done good and has ceased to be indicated, the choice of the remedy to follow will be greatly assisted by a knowledge of CLINICAL RELATIONSHIPS. I have therefore given a tabulated list of all the remedies in the *materia medica* with their antidotes and other related remedies. In compiling this table I have

made use of the excellent table published by Dr. Gibson Miller in the *Homeopathic World* of September, 1902. It will be noticed that many of the remedies have no related remedies placed to their credit. This does not mean that such do not exist, but only that they have not been observed and recorded. I have not on that account omitted them from the list, and the vacant spaces will serve the purpose of providing a place for their entry whenever they may be found.

It will therefore be seen that the CLINICAL REPERTORY is a clinical repertory and much more besides. The practitioner who consults it will not be tied down to a mere list of names of diseases : he will be able to test his choice of a remedy from other points of view, and if further information should be required, the *Dictionary of Materia Medica*, which this REPERTORY is designed to make more accessible, will supply it.

A necessary preliminary to the compilation of a work of this nature was to fix the abbreviation which should always represent each remedy named. In making choice of these abbreviations I have followed largely those selected by the compilers of the *Cypher Repertory*. The chief object aimed at in the selection has been to choose a combination of letters which shall at once suggest the remedy and not suggest any other remedy. This, as a matter of course, is an ideal which cannot always be attained, but to make identification as easy as possible I have given two lists—first a list of remedies in alphabetical order with the abbreviations appended to each, and next a list of abbreviations in alphabetical order with the remedy it stands for appended. It will be observed that I have followed the *Cypher Repertory* in using the letter "x." to signify "acid"; "Nt. x." is "nitric acid"; "Fl. x." "fluoric acid," &c. Every time a medicine is mentioned it begins with a capital letter. When a name has two parts the second part always begins with a small letter. Thus, in the text, it will be impossible to mistake where the name of one remedy ends and the other begins.

It will be gathered from the above that the CLINICAL REPERTORY is intended to serve a purpose of its own. It is given to the world as complete in itself within the range of its aims. A *Symptom-Repertory* to the *Dictionary* is a very different matter and a much larger undertaking. But I do not despair of seeing that work accomplished one day. Some little progress has, in fact, already been made towards the carrying out of this project.
